

For Further Reflection/Application: Lord help us to be effectually doers of the Word!

Michael W. Smith's latest hymn, *God with God*, does a fantastic job of presenting the heavenly heights of Divine glory surrounding the long-awaited arrival of the Christ-child. God's holiness, His Triunity, His eternality, His aseity, and many other glorious doctrines and precious truths are proclaimed in this new Christmas hymn. One will not appreciate fully the wonders of the incarnation (John 1:14) without first grasping the deep truths proclaimed in John 1:1f.

God with God is a marvelous summary of John 1:1-18 and leads believers to exalted praise! As an aside, great preaching ought to inspire great song/hymn writing. Great song/hymn writing certainly inspires passionate, biblical preaching!

O Come Let us Adore Him! An unbeliever likely wonders, "Why should I care about Christ's birth, let alone join you in worshipping a child who was born over 2000 years ago?" "Why do Christians make such a big deal out of 'Jesus' birth?" Muslim's (erroneously) reject Christ's Deity, in part, because of his human nature (see the song above- Is this Not the Carpenter?). Once again, we're reminded that theology is life. What you know and believe impacts how you live! Who you worship. How you view eternity and how you die.

Glossing over the heavenly heights of Trinitarian majesty, as I fear we often do, is no small thing. If we fail to esteem Christ's eternal Divinity, we won't truly appreciation His *sacrificial incarnation* or his *substitutionary death!* We will fail to celebrate the greatest (Christmas) gift!
