For Further Reflection: Lord help us to be doers of the Word and not just sermon connoisseurs

What is the most important thing you heard today? How were you encouraged, challenged, and/or convicted? What do you want to study further as a result of listening to today's message?

What is the most unexpected appearance you've experienced? What happened? In John 20 the fog is lifted over the heart of Jesus' grief-stricken disciples. What does the bodily resurrection of Christ have to do with "Cloud 9 comfort and joy?"

Christians often focus lots of attention on the birth of Christ/Messiah's arrival and on the death of the Savior (as we should), but often miss the significance of the resurrection. How come? How can we help correct this? How does the resurrection (Jn 20) relate to Christmas (Luke 2)?

"The resurrection was the triune God's 'Amen' to all that Christ did on earth as Mediator." Mark Jones. John Knox called the bodily resurrection of Christ the chief article of the faith. By raising Christ from the dead, the Father "established both His authority and His acceptance that Jesus did all that was required in His covenant with the Father (Psalm 89)." Mark Jones.

Read Romans 1:4. How does the resurrection act as the greatest sign that Jesus is in fact God incarnate, the eternal Son of God? Christ's death will end in victory! Glory, Hallelujah!

Mark's Gospel includes 3 explicit predictions about Jesus' death and resurrection. Yet the disciples struggled to believe that these events would happen as they happened. How come? Note Mark 8:31; 9:31; 10:34. Note also Luke 24:26-27 and 1 Corinthians 15:3-4.

Talk about how last Sunday's opening illustration (Willington Defeat_____) powerfully illustrates John 20:11-18. Have you ever responded wrongly to what proved to be an *incomplete* message?

Why did the preacher label last week's passage/sermon, "Resurrected Joy?" Talk about the danger of an incomplete (Gospel) message. Note the opening illustration from last week.

Add the following Resurrection songs to your playlist and let me know in a few weeks how this impacts your daily walk. Note: *Hail the Day!* Sovereign Grace; *Christ the Lord is Risen Today*; Hymn. *Christ Arose!* (*Lo in the Grave He Lays*); *See What a Morning!* Getty music. *Was it a Morning Like This?* Sandi Patty *Christ Our Hope in Life and Death*. Getty music. *Christ is Risen! He is Risen Indeed!* Getty music. *All Hail the Glorious Christ!* Sovereign Grace. What are some other resurrection hymns/songs that are edifying?

What is "the Magdalene mission and what do you have in common with it?" The LORD chose both *female* and *male* disciples to bear witness to the most important event in history! All believers are called to share the gospel message today as well via local outreach and personal evangelism! "You shall by My witnesses!" Memorize Romans 10:9 and 1 Corinthians 15:3-4. Note Acts 1:3. The Gospel is inseparably linked to three historical events (1 Cor. 15:3-4; Romans 10:9). If the bodily resurrection of Christ *never happened*, what difference would it make? (1 Cor. 15:12f)

- I) Bask in the light of resurrection glory; (John 20; 1 Cor. 15).
- II) Allow resurrection hope to literally fill your life with joy and purpose! (Rom. 8:18-25).
- III) For those grieving the passing of a beloved Christian, take heart! (John 11:25f; 1 Thess. 4:13-18) Jesus' bodily resurrection personally guarantees ours! Grieve with HOPE!
- IV) For the sick, who wonder if the end is near, be not afraid! (1 Cor. 15:55)
- V) May we wait eagerly for the blessed hope- the appearing and glory of our great God and Living Savior, Jesus Christ! (Phil. 3:20-21)

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
